Our minds inspired by hope and anticipation are forces for good and excellence in all our endeavors. Our imaginations driven by fear and suspicion can be corrosive and limiting to ourselves and others. As parents and educators, we observe our children and try to determine if they are progressing with confidence or holding themselves back in their response to new challenges. Perhaps this is the reason why we respond with elation to them when they master a new skill even in the face of fear, like when they first master their bike without training wheels or when they reach out to pet the neighbor's dog even though they are unsure of the outcome.

One of the most important lessons we want our children to absorb is how their reaction to a situation can determine whether they "own" the results of their efforts, or if they attribute a negative result to others. We sense the importance of this life lesson and want to see our children gain the skills and confidence to be masters of their own destiny. The good news is that this is a built-in sensibility. It serves as a guide and compass as we raise our kids and mentor them through their formative years. We reap the rewards of doing this job well for the sake of our kids and community.
